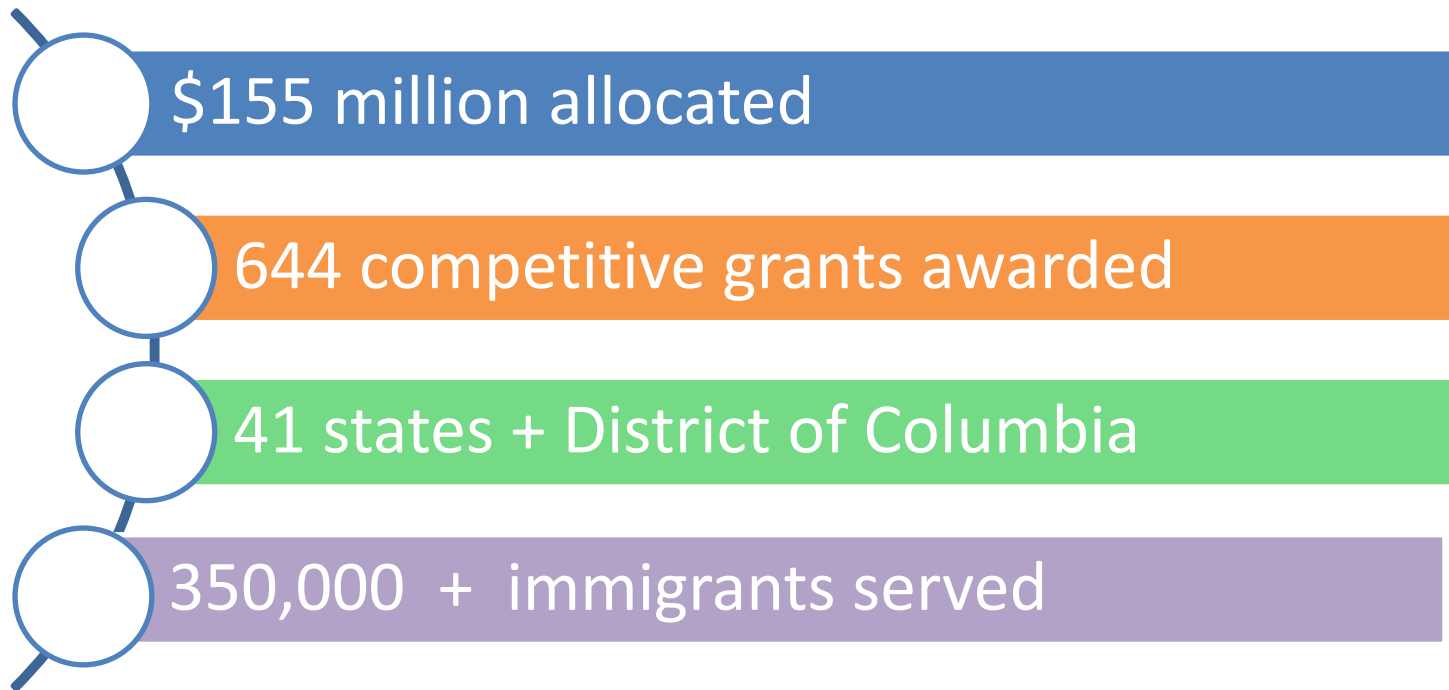
The goal of the Citizenship and Integration Grant Program is to:

- Expand the availability of high-quality citizenship preparation services for immigrants across the nation; and
- Provide opportunities for immigrants to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to integrate into the fabric of American society.

In FY 2024, USCIS will offer \$12.6 million through two competitive funding opportunities:

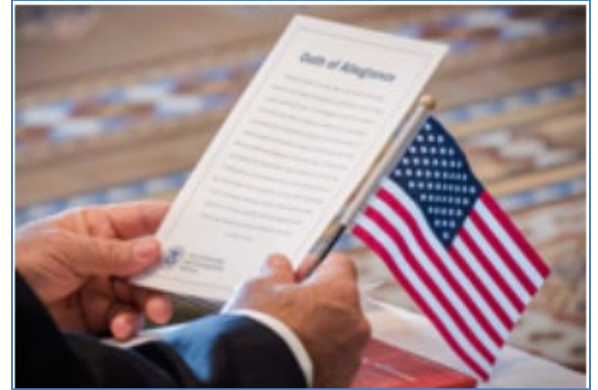
- Citizenship Instruction and Naturalization Application Services Grant (CINAS)
- Citizenship and Integration Training Academy (CITA)

CINAS Overview

- Approximately 40 grants of up to \$300,000 each
- Two-year period of performance: October 1, 2024 – September 30, 2026
- The goal of the CINAS grant is to support organizations that provide direct citizenship preparation services to immigrants



CINAS Overview, Cont.

- **Citizenship Instruction Services:** Educational services that provide enrolled immigrants with the skills and knowledge needed to prepare for citizenship, including instruction in English as a second language (ESL), U.S. history and government, and the naturalization process.
- **Naturalization Application Services:** Within the scope of the authorized practice of immigration law, grant recipients must assist qualified program participants by conducting naturalization eligibility screening, preparing and submitting Form N-400, Application for Naturalization, preparing for the naturalization interview, and providing ongoing case management as needed.

Who Can Apply for CINAS?

A diverse range of organizations are eligible to apply, including:

- City, township and county governments
- Independent school districts
- Indian/Native American tribally designated organizations and governments
- Public/Indian housing authorities
- Nonprofits with 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(6) IRS status, other than institutions of higher education
- Private, public and state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Special district governments
- State governments

- Organizations may now apply for the FY 24 Citizenship Instruction and Naturalization Application Services Grant (CINAS) Notice of Funding Opportunity on www.grants.gov.
- Applications are due by 11:59 p.m. Eastern on 6/21/2024 via grants.gov.
- All applicants must have:
 - a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) number,
 - a valid Employer Identification Number (EIN), and
 - an updated System for Award Management (SAM) account prior to submitting an application.

Review and Selection Process for CINAS

- Initial eligibility review to ensure each application meets the minimum eligibility requirements
- Merit review of all eligible applications:
 - USCIS will convene panels of grant reviewers
 - Applications will be scored and ranked based on the criteria in the NOFO
- Selection and final award notification completed prior to October 1, 2024

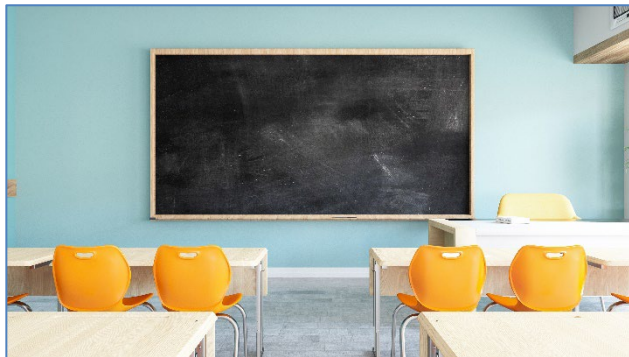
FY 2024 Notice of Funding Opportunity: Citizenship and Integration Training Academy (CITA)

In FY 2024, USCIS will offer \$2.6 million through a new competitive funding opportunity:

- Citizenship and Integration Training Academy (CITA)



CITA Overview



- Approximately 7 grants of up to \$400,000 each
- Three-year period of performance: October 1, 2024 – September 30, 2027.
- The goal of the CITA grant is to train a new cadre of citizenship instructors and oversee the development of new citizenship programs.
- The funding will provide support to organizations that have not previously received USCIS funding.

CITA Overview, Cont.

Year One:

- During year one, USCIS will provide 12 months of rigorous, mandatory training to enable organizations to establish and implement high-quality citizenship education programs for LPRs in year two and three.
- The CITA program will offer an optional component for funded organizations to pursue and establish a naturalization application services program staffed by two Department of Justice-accredited representatives.



CITA Overview, Cont.

Year Two:

- During year two, grant recipients **MUST** launch a citizenship education program, applying the knowledge and expertise learned in year one.
- Awardees that elect to establish a naturalization application services program **MUST** launch this program during year two of the grant



CITA Overview, Cont.



Year Three:

- During year three, grant recipients are expected to have a fully operational citizenship education program and, if applicable, a fully operational naturalization application services program.
- USCIS staff will continue to provide on-going technical assistance in response to program performance challenges or deficiencies.



Who Can Apply for CITA?



- Applicants must demonstrate a minimum of one year of experience within the past three years providing adult education, English as a second language (ESL) instruction, or other services to adult immigrants.
- Applicants must also demonstrate extensive knowledge of the community they propose to serve.
- Applicants may *not* have received previous USCIS grants funds, as a primary grant recipient, subrecipient, or contractor.

Who Can Apply for CITA?, Cont.

- Nonprofits with 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(6) IRS status
- City, township, county, and state governments
- Special district governments
- Public/Indian housing authorities
- Indian/Native American tribal organizations and governments
- Public or state-controlled institutions of higher education
- Independent school districts
- Historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs)
- Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian serving institutions
- Tribally controlled colleges and universities (TCCUs)

 - a valid Employer Identification Number (EIN); and
 - an updated System for Award Management (SAM) account before they submit an application.

CITA applications are due by July 12, 2024.

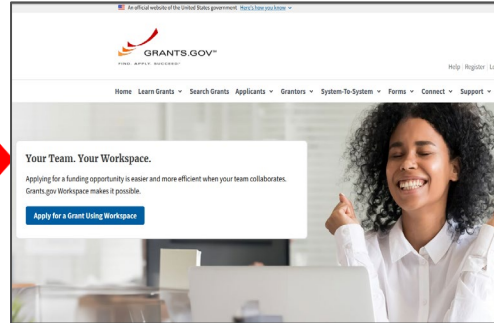
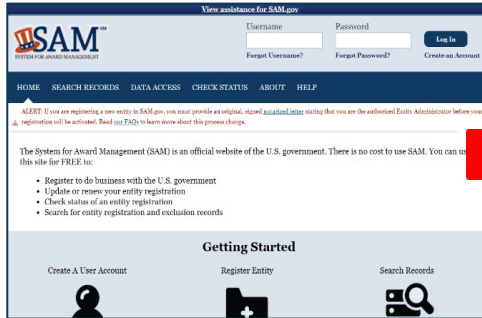

- Complete registration with SAM at: www.SAM.gov to receive UEI
- Establish E-Business Point of Contact (EBiz POC): Individual who oversees all activities for organization within Grants.gov and approves the AOR
- 7-10 (or more) business days after completely registering, including submitting notarized letter to SAM

Registration: SAM.gov and Grants.gov

- Organization data and EBiz POC information are transferred electronically from SAM to Grants.gov.
- Applicants within the organization can add a new profile to their account to associate with the organization.

- NOTE: SAM registration must be renewed annually.

Crafting Grant Proposals and Submitting Applications

- Register and submit early.
- Thoroughly read and follow all the instructions provided by the agency.
- Fill out SF-424 forms first.
- Include sufficient program and budget details.
- Attachment file names must be 50 characters or less and only contain UTF-8 characters.
- Use correct UEI (Unique Entity Identifier) when creating a workspace.
- Make sure you have Grants.gov compatible PDF software (Adobe Reader).
